An Inside Look at the Casino del Sol With Rosalind Zhu

Tucson, Arizona. As soon as Rosalind Zhu (a 19-year-old from the rainy city of Seattle, Washington), stepped off the plane and into the Arizona sun, she knew this internship was "going to bring the heat." From the moment she met her supervisors, Mark and Leeann Scheller, Zhu felt the effects of their determination, leadership, and innovation as they prepared for the opening of Tucson's Casino del Sol Resort, Spa, and Conference Center. Owned by the Pascua Yaqui Tribe and nestled in the secluded high desert with 215 luxurious suites and over 65,000 square feet of functional space, Casino del Sol is scheduled to open on November 11, 2011.

As the sun glared down on the hotel, Zhu sat inside an air-conditioned office unknowingly making executive decisions related to hotel sales. Her first day on-site began with rudimentary work. She sorted papers by states and answered the telephones. However, as rudimentary as this work seemed, it

provided her with key insight into "all the different types of businesses, associations, and SMERFs that utilize hotel and conference spaces." Zhu's work shifted from clerical to research. She began searching for different conventions, festivals, and expositions that were already located in Arizona. In doing so, she learned how to solicit these various vendors' services for Casino del Sol. As her first week continued, Zhu got up-front and personal. She attended luncheons and networking events with her supervisors, which were incredibly exciting and didactic; Zhu commented: "they knew everyone! It was amazing being introduced to so many industry leaders while learning about everything from jazz music to the Hispanic demographic in Arizona."

Another valuable aspect of this internship was experiencing the culture that influenced the owners of Casino del Sol. The Pascua Yaqui tribe is a Native American tribe whose descendents are from the Uto-Aztecan's of Mexico. They have owned and played pivotal roles in the casino's expansion for over 20 years. During this first week, when Zhu wasn't involved with luncheons and networking events, she was introduced to the tribe. Chico (a member of the tribe) gave her a detailed account of the history, symbols, and origins of the Pascua Yaqui Tribe, along with a tour of the reservation; it was one of Zhu's favorite parts of the internship. During the opening ceremony of the wellness center, Zhu saw a tribal council meeting and watched a native ceremonial dance.

Overall, Zhu has gained invaluable knowledge about critical elements of the hotel, including its culture, casino, and sales. Zhu explained: "During the amazing and event-filled first week, I learned more than an entire month spent in class."

Tri Delta Sister Visits India to Learn, Work, and Grow

Alexandra Ruby, from San Diego, is a sophomore in the School of Industrial Labor Relations. She spent her summer taking classes and participating in an internship in India. She was part-way through this experience when she shared the following with her sisters.

This summer, I am spending seven weeks in various parts of India through an ILR program called "Global Service Learning." Basically, the program offers classes for two weeks on various topics: Indian culture, Indian gender studies, Indian labor economics, and Kannada (the southern Indian native language).



After those two weeks, each student in the program engages in an independent "project" basically an internship that caters to the students' interests or skills—for the sponsoring NGO, Swami Vivekenanda Youth Movement. This NGO is one of the most successful in India; for 25 years running, it has done more to enhance the quality of life for impoverished Indians than any other NGO in the country. SVYM has many hospitals, schools, and offices scattered throughout India. It is completely supported by donations and run by people who make it their lives' work to further the NGO's mission. Needless to say, I jumped (more like threw myself) at this opportunity, which was entirely sponsored by ILR.

I'm at the point in my trip where I've finished the two weeks of classes in Mysore, Karnataka, and am about to begin my "project" in Sargur, where SVYM has both a hospital and a youth school. I'll be working on accounting for the organization and learning cricket during recess with the local school children.

Aside from taking classes (which were fascinating, especially the gender studies course), I had the privilege of exploring India in my free time. I went on tours of the Mysore Palace and other ancient temples; I even squeezed in some sari shopping.

One of my most memorable moments in

these two weeks, "Indian Prom 2011." SVYM scheduled a cultural performance for us in the city's theater and informed us they would send buses to pick all of us up. All of the girls in my group had purchased saris the day before. The giddy high school girl inside of me couldn't help but think, "PROM!" With our colorful dresses, "limo buses," and corsages and boutonnieres fashioned from local garden flowers, it was perfect.

On a more serious note, India has truly been an experience that has allowed me to reflect on what it means to be an American, a woman, and ... well, me. In a country where women are heavily oppressed by virtue of conservative clothing, limited educational opportunities, and arranged marriages (yes, they're still prevalent) I have unexpectedly met an overwhelming number of powerful, intelligent, radiant women. The people I've met here have undoubtedly been some of the poorest I've ever encountered, yet, because I am a guest, they shower me with hospitality. Those with the fewest means offer me the most, and I am incredibly humbled by it. I still have five more weeks of my adventure, and I can't wait to be back home in good old Ithaca to share stories with my Delta sisters. Like joining Tri Delta, this experience has definitely shaped my life.
