
A Note From The Chapter President

Alpha Betas Renovate The House

These past couples of months have brought many changes to the Tri-Delt house. With a generous allotment of money from the house corporation for some much-needed improvements, many sisters have been working with Jenna Lewis (president) and Josie Lee (house mom) to maintain and update the house.

A committee of in-house sisters spent hours researching and looking for furniture for the living room. They finally found what they were looking for, and, in the beginning of December, three couches, a coffee table, two end tables, two floor lamps, three table lamps, and an armoire arrived to give the living room a new and elegant look. Two beautiful chandeliers were also installed. The new layout of the room will make the room more conducive to social interaction among sisters.

The kitchen is also going through major renovations. The scratched and scuffed floor is being refinished, and new wallpaper is replacing the old. The kitchen chairs and tables are being refinished and repaired, and new blinds and curtains are being bought for the newly fixed screen doors.

The foyer, too, is changing. Cost-efficient stone-looking tile will replace the present carpet. This will eliminate the problems we have experienced of the destruction of the carpet by salt and mud every winter and the annual need for repair and replacement.

A chandelier that matches the newly installed chandeliers in the living room is replacing the tarnished one that is there now.

Walls will be decorated with Tri-Delta memorabilia, including awards, plaques, and pictures. We have purchased over 40 beautiful frames to use for the decades-old black-and-white photographs taken at Tri-Delta formals and for the many composites we have dating back to the 1960s. These will be hung in the living room, foyer, and hallways to decorate the house and to remind us of the history of Tri-Delta.

Once the rest of the house is completed, our attention will be turned to the chapter room. While it should be a source of pride for the house, our chapter room floods and has been neglected for years. We need to stop the flooding and repair the rotting walls and then repaint and decorate the room. We hope to equip this room with new chairs so that every sister can sit comfortably during chapter.

The design committee hopes that these changes will instill in all sisters a new respect and love for the house. In fact, it has already. With all of these exciting changes taking place in the house, sisters can hardly wait for everything to be done. This renovation has brought much excitement to all collegiate members of the Alpha Beta Chapter.
